

Plants that Require Special Attention for Fall Digging/Planting

Our experience at Lake County Nursery, Inc. has shown that certain trees require special attention when dug in the fall. With proper care these plants can be successfully transplanted in the fall. However, it is the purchaser's responsibility to ensure that the proper cultural practices are followed for successful fall transplanting. Lake County Nursery assumes no responsibility for the survival of the following varieties when dug in the fall and will code such orders as 'Dug at Customers Risk':

Betula varieties
Carpinus varieties
Cercis canadensis
Cornus varieties*
Corylus spp.*
Crataegus varieties
Ginko biloba*
Koelreuteria paniculata
Liriodendron tulipifera
Liquidambar styraciflua*
Magnolia varieties
Nyssa sylvatica*
Oxydendron arboreum
Platanus acerifolia
Populus varieties
Prunus - All stone fruits*
Pyrus varieties*
Quercus varieties*
Salix, weeping varieties
Taxodium distichum
Zelkova varieties

***Requires special attention when transplanting both in the spring and fall.**

Guidelines for Fall Planting:

1. Use good quality topsoil.
2. Top-dress trees with an organic mulch, such as leaves or shredded bark, at a depth of 4-6" for winter root protection.
3. Protect all new planting from salt spray, either by avoiding planting near areas where air borne salt is a problem, or by erecting a protective screen.
